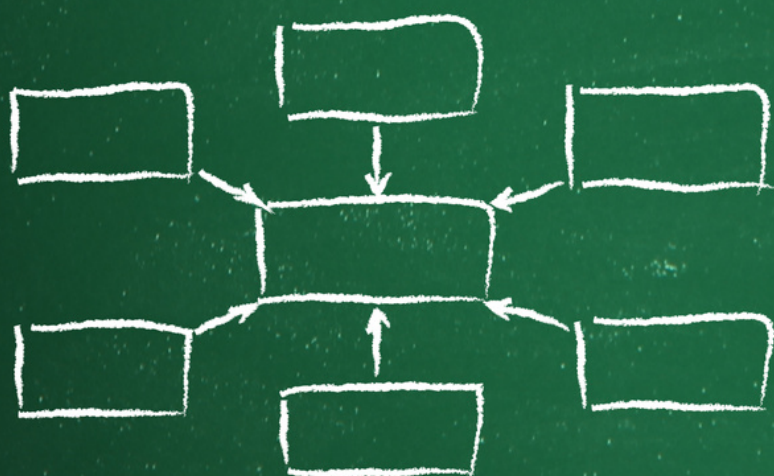

What does the SIRIUS Index look at?

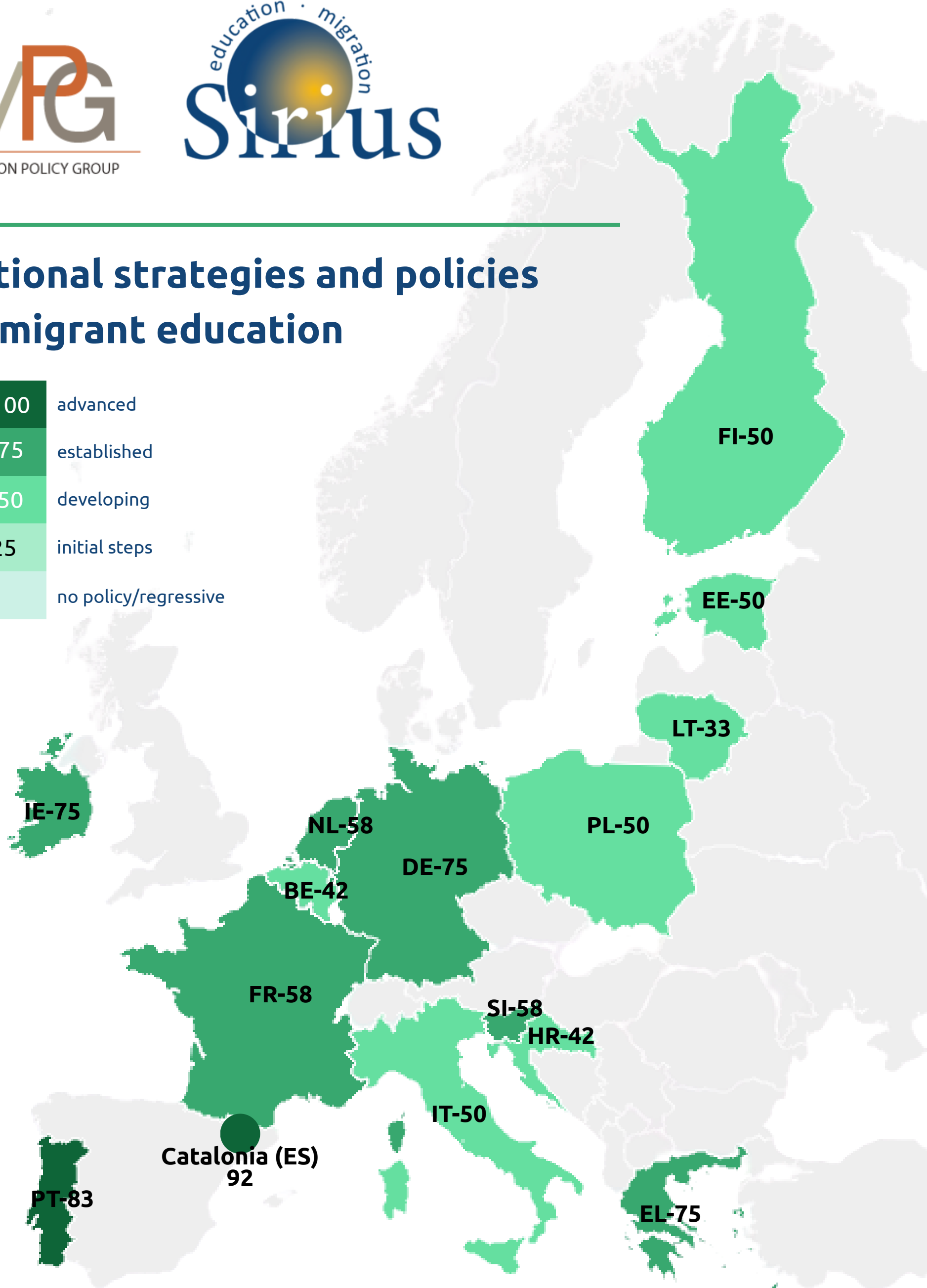
This dimension checks whether countries are truly planning for migrant inclusion.

It looks for six building blocks:

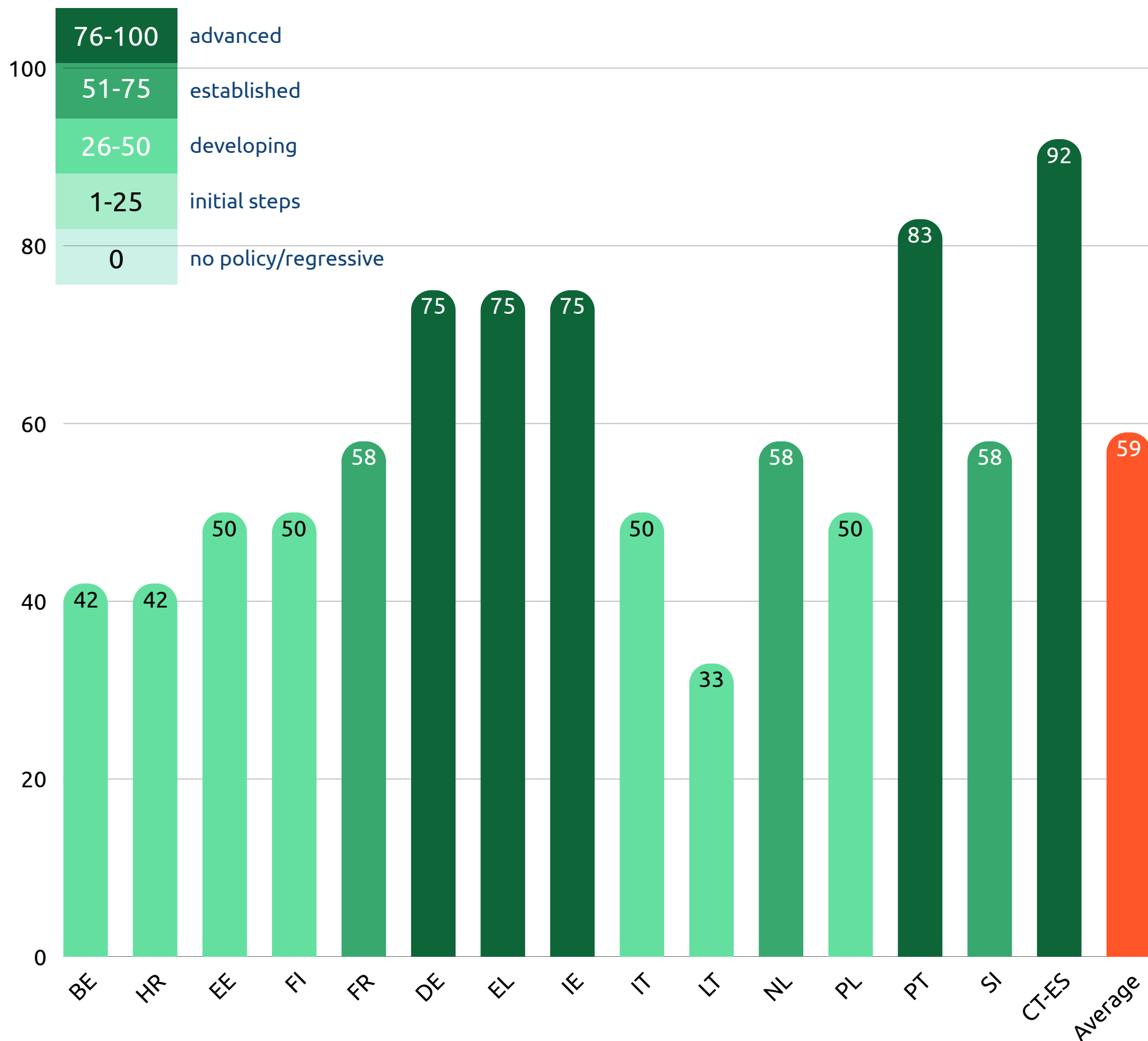
1. A national strategy
2. Dedicated teams and institutions
3. Regular reviews to keep policies up to date
4. Migrant education integrated across the system
5. Fair funding for schools that need it most
6. Data to track what works - and what does not.

What it looks like when it works

Catalonia (Spain) leads with a regional strategy, anti-segregation measures, and newcomer support.

Portugal ties national planning to funding and local action.

Ireland connects integration policy to school and language support.

Germany aligns national goals with regional plans.

Finland offers targeted help for new arrivals through a dedicated education plan.



Where it's still missing

Many systems do not yet have a clear national strategy.

Some lack coordination, funding, or reliable data.

Without a clear strategy, schools are left to improvise, leading to uneven support and a greater risk of exclusion for migrant learners.

countries need more than good intentions.

They need strong plans,
the tools to act, and the data to adjust.

It's time to turn scattered efforts
into long-term change.
